# Sample Lesson Plan – Easiest Book Club Ever Week One – Introduction and Predicting

## Welcome (5 minutes)

- Introduce yourself
- Housekeeping (washrooms, emergency procedures etc.)
- Set a welcoming tone (food and drink definitely helps!)

## **Group understandings/working principles** (10 minutes)

- Discuss as a group (examples include *unplug from distractions, everyone will have an opportunity to speak and the right to pass, there are no right or wrong answers, no reading ahead, have fun*)
- Note the 'club rules' on flip chart paper and post at every meeting for easy reference

## Icebreaker (10 minutes)

- Introduces participants to one another
- If your group is big enough try 'Find Someone Who...' BINGO (works best with 8 or more participants)
- For a smaller group try Character Match
  - Print out a well-known character name and the title of their books on index cards (with this group, use movie tie ins)
  - Have each book club member choose a card and find their match
  - Encourage discussion (have they read the book? seen the movie?)

#### Book Talk (10-20 minutes)

- Introduce the concept of fiction (imaginary events and people) vs nonfiction (true, fact based) books
  - Provide a handout or read aloud some different titles and have group (either working in pairs or as large group) sort by fiction or nonfiction
- Introduce the different genres (types) of books (mystery, romance, history, crime, humor, inspirational, biography, thriller, western, science fiction etc.)
  - Borrow a selection of different books from library or a personal collection (or print/photocopy book covers ) and have participants sort through the books and divide by genre based on title and cover illustration

Break (10- 15 minutes)

## Predict (30-40 minutes)

- Predicting is a valuable reading strategy. How to predict:
  - 1. Look at the title
  - 2. Look at the cover picture
  - 3. Use what you already know (prior knowledge)
- Use the sample book cover to model predicting for participants.
- Invite participants to work individually or in small groups to practice predicting.
- Once they have had a chance to practice, introduce the book club selection.
  - A. Write the title of the book on the white board. Ask for predictions.
  - B. Provide the book to participants asking them to look at cover only (cover back blurb with post it). Add to predictions.
  - C. While recording, ask participants to explain the predictions they have made and connect the predictions to their prior knowledge.
  - D. Have participants remove the post it and read the back cover. Given the varying literacy levels, it is important that the facilitator read aloud as well.
  - E. Compare predictions. Alter predictions based on what participants have learned about the book.
  - F. If time allows, read the first and last paragraph of chapter 1 and further alter predictions.
  - G. Tell participants you will keep their predictions and review them at the end of book club.

**Closure** (5 minutes) Ask participants to read 1-3 chapters of the book before next week. Remind participants not to read ahead! Next week – Characters!
