

**Tech Talk** Full-day session (A1/B1/C1/D1) 9:00 - 4:20

This 1-day training will provide opportunities for the participants to gain the understanding they need to be flexible and adaptable when training others in technology. This interactive session will provide tools that participants can use to encourage learners to identify common concepts, structures and navigational methods, rather than a "step-by-step, how-to "approach". Facilitation/instruction is based on best practice in adult learning and brain learning. Strategies and activities that can be used with adult learners will be modeled throughout the day. *Participants must bring their own device (phone, tablet, computer etc.) as well as ear phone/buds.* Some preparation is required (maximum ½ hour) and an email will be sent out a few weeks prior with the information. Participants should have a good background in technology.

- Participants will gain an understanding of common concepts, structures and navigation methods present across the many different technology tools found in work, play and community that include but not limited to tablets, phones and computers.
- Participants will be able to transfer this knowledge to enhance existing classes or design new ones that better address the rapid changes occurring in the world of technology.
- Participants will receive current relevant resources that will support their work in building technology skills with foundational and literacy learners.

This innovative collaboration will provide a model for other CALP programs seeking to work with local employers to support the integration of newcomer staff. Most CALP staff are working with adults with some kind of challenge or Learning Disability (diagnosed or undiagnosed) which has impeded their ability to read, write, or do math at higher levels. You can support success for your CALP learners; it's easier than you think! Learn how to easily determine where your learner is at with reading, writing and math, then offer effective ways for the learner to progress in each area.

#### **Learning Objectives**

- Practitioners will learn how to access and implement easy-to-use resources to support your learners:
  - sight/sound reading program which, after set up, allows the learner to progress without one-to-one tutoring.
  - a speech to text writing program which after set up and little one-to-one oversight allows the learner to speak to the computer to complete writing tasks.
  - a clear step by step math whole numbers, decimals and fractions program with emphasis on the process, instead of the endless repetition of practice.
  - when and how to refer and advocate for formal assessment and sources of funding for psychological assessments to formalize an LD determination
- In this session, participants will:
  - o practice the process of offering the oral reading program
  - o navigate through the Windows Speech Recognition program
  - role-play methods for math delivery
- Participants will leave with the following:
  - LD support sites and videos
  - step by step sight-reading method with resources for building a CALP reading program
  - Power Point instructions for the implementation of Windows Speech Recognition
  - specific student math programs for addition, subtraction, multiplication and division of whole numbers, decimals and fractions

Through reflection and sharing, participants will identify ways that they have been honouring those relationships and to devise strategies to strengthen them. They will be given a list of resources for further exploration of Reconciliation.
