CLN is dedicated to providing relevant and responsive training, professional development, networking opportunities, and support to over 80 Community Adult Learning Programs (CALPs) throughout Alberta.

REGIONAL SUPPORT AND COACHING CONNECTIONS

This last year most coaching and connecting took place on the phone, before and after online training events, using online video applications like Zoom or Teams, and by email. While there were some limited opportunities for in-person connecting, the CLN team used these varied ways to connect, so we could continue to meet CALP staff "where they are at".

Without the limitations that come with traveling to meet face-to-face, CLN staff continued to build new relationships beyond regional boundaries, to provide this "just in time" support. Our team was able to provide provincial coaching and mentorship in an enhanced and extended way. As we often say, "any door is the right door" to access support!



New this year, we also saw trends in the support that was needed that were definitely influenced by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, including:

- the desire from CALP staff to build up their own digital skills, understanding and engagement with technology and online tools
- boards and senior staff were looking for support with health-related policies, and human resources in general

PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITIES AND CALP CONNECTIONS

Provincial Connections Week

Spring Regional Meetings which are normally held in-person were moved online. In place of the face-to-face meetings we have held in previous years, this year CLN hosted an online Provincial Connections Week. The week-long event included regional meetings, and three high profile featured speakers.

The speakers addressed key topics identified as emerging and on-going needs for CALP staff, including:

Regional Connections Sessions at the 2020 Literacy and Learning Symposium (Virtual)

The virtual Symposium included a Regional Connections Session that focused on the peer to peer connecting and networking that CALP staff have come to expect from their regional meeting.

Connections Cafés

In 2020-2021, regional **Connections Cafés** provided safe, welcoming and brave spaces that encouraged CALP staff to meet, connect, share and learn online with their peers. These virtual spaces became a regular destination for many CALP staff.

Our Connections Café principles are:

- Whoever comes are the right people...
- · Whenever you arrive is the right time...
- Whatever happens is the only thing that could have happened...
- When it's over it's over!



As CALP staff navigated their COVID-19 response, these connection points were a bright light. Staff looked forward to the opportunity to connect and learn online with their peers. They felt less isolated and were able to participate in conversations that reflected their desire to hold space for themselves and others.

2020 LITERACY AND LEARNING SYMPOSIUM (VIRTUAL)

This year CLN staff and board successfully redesigned the Symposium in-person event into our first-ever fully virtual event due to Alberta Health Services' COVID-19 gathering restrictions.

While planning our event we considered the following guiding guestions:

- What will we bring with us from before?
- What will we leave behind?
- What new ways of working will we keep?

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- What will we do differently, value more, and care deeply about when we move forward?
- And what will we be focused on?

Even during the pandemic, CALP staff and partners continued to recognize and appreciate the value of the Literacy and Learning Symposium in supporting their professional development needs.

MÉTIS AND INDIGENOUS CONNECTIONS AND SUPPORT

We know that there are many Métis and Indigenous learners in the communities served by CALP but these learners are under-represented in CALP programs. To help grow understanding and relationship-building, this year, CLN's Métis and Indigenous Liaison invested in one-on-one conversations with CALP staff throughout the province, to explore a range of questions and topics such as:

- Engaging and retaining First Nations, Métis and Inuit learners
- Community assessment to engage Indigenous learners getting to know your community, where to find historical information, building relationships before partnerships
- Building relationship with First Nations communities
- Appropriate language when speaking with Indigenous peoples
- How to approach, engage and support Elders
- Understanding and practicing protocol, including where to purchase tobacco and appropriate gifts and compensation/honorarium
- Land Acknowledgments (how to do it, who to include, who should do one, when, etc.)
- Cree language resources
- Indigenous-based educational resources (books, language, history, culture)

To help bridge relationship building and understanding between cultures, CLN's Métis and Indigenous Liaison led a community of practice for CALP staff across the province to have a safe space to learn more about Métis and Indigenous peoples.

New This Year: Sharing Circle for Indigenous CALP Practitioners

This virtual circle is intended to create a space for CALP staff whom self identify as Indigenous, Métis or Inuit. It is intended to draw on the wisdom and knowledge of the Indigenous CALP staff from across the province. It is a space to consult with other Indigenous peoples, to have and hold open conversations on events/issues that are happening in Alberta/Canada that are or may effect Indigenous learners.







TRAINING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Online delivery of PD and training was the priority this year to ensure that CALP staff had access to relevant and practical learning opportunities despite restrictions for meeting in-person due to COVID-19.

CLN offered training to meet the varied needs of CALP staff in many roles, from volunteer tutor, instructor, office staff, program coordinator, executive director, to board member.



Delivered **21** additional trainings to **575** participants

In addition to trainings delivered as part of our work through our PD Delivery grant from Advanced Education, CLN was also able to leverage funding to continue offering other training and PD opportunities:



- Strengthening Literacy Practices an 8-month cohort based learning journey, where CALP staff build their confidence and capacity to deliver effective literacy and foundational learning in their communities
- **Psychological First Aid** Training from the Canadian Red Cross, to help CALP staff build their skills and awareness in self-care and caring for others

I wanted to take a moment to say thank you to the CLN for the amazing training opportunities we have had this past year. Terri Peters, Jenny Horsman, Heather Plett, spring regional meeting speakers and so many more. CALP staff and volunteer tutors have had the chance to work in small groups with both Terri and Jenny through the mentorship opportunities. The knowledge shared with our team (in both mentorships and workshops) has taught us to better understand our learners, ourselves and our literacy practices. Thank you to the CLN team for responding to our training needs.

Required Training

When it became clear in the spring of 2020 that the COVID-19 health restrictions would be long-lasting, CLN refocused our resources to convert the two required trainings into online courses to ensure that CALP staff could meet their grant requirements for training and complete Introduction to Adult Foundational Learning and/or CALP Essentials for Family Literacy Programs.

The new online training courses combined a series of weekly synchronous video-conference sessions with asynchronous self-study and online discussions on the CALP Portal.

I liked the mixture of in-class "lectures" and group work combined with individual assignments that were due before the start of each class. The mixture of tasks suited many different learning styles and motivated me to continue participating.









CULTURE OF COLLABORATION: CONNECTING TO COMMUNITY

This year, CLN continued the Culture of Collaboration Initiative, acknowledging that provincial restrictions would have a huge impact on the traditional face-to-face dialogue approaches taken in previous years. However we provided funding, mentorship, coaching, tools and resources to support CALPs who wanted to find innovative ways to bring their communities together in innovative ways.



Each of the four CALPs who engaged in community conversations were very satisfied with the results and new processes adapted for the pandemic.

I found interest in connecting through focus groups was high and many organizations were wanting to connect (...) With uncertainty due to COVID-19 many organizations were open to dialoguing and felt safe in the online zoom setting.
